## Termly Curriculum Information for Parents - Reception

### What your child will be learning about this summer term and how you can help at home

#### Literacy

In the first half of term, we will be focusing on reading stories, poetry and non-fiction books about **Minibeasts**. As a whole class, the children will be reading the following texts: *'Snail Trail'*; *'The Bee Book'*; *'The Very Busy Spider'*; and *'The Very Hungry Caterpillar'*. In the second half of term, we will be focusing on stories, poetry and non-fiction books about **Travelling and Transport**. As a whole class, the children will be reading the following texts: *'The Journey Home from Grandpa's'*, *'How Will We Get to the Beach?'*, *'Mr. Gumpy's Outing'*, *'Whatever Next!'*, and *'Rosie's Walk'*. We will explore all of these texts through role-play, by reading different versions of the texts and by rewriting the stories. The texts will be used to model writing and to extend skills in grammar, vocabulary and spelling.

This term, we will continue to use the *Little Wandle* phonics programme to develop reading, writing and spelling skills. The children will continue work on recognising sounds and writing these correctly.

During adult-focused activities, the children will be encouraged to think of sentences and record these with support. They will also have opportunities to engage in independent writing activities throughout the day where they will further develop their writing skills with a focus on writing for different purposes. We will look at the thought process of writing a sentence and think about how we can make our sentences more exciting e.g. by adding adjectives.

We will also be working hard to develop your child's fluency in reading, encouraging reading with expression and developing comprehension skills. The children will engage in daily supported reading sessions to help develop confidence and skill at reading.

#### Things to do at home...

Please **read with your child** for 15 minutes every evening. It is the single most important thing that you can do to help them educationally.

**Play games** such as 'I Spy...' and **sing favourite songs and nursery rhymes.**



#### Mathematics:

This term, Reception will be learning the following:

##### Number:

Building numbers and continuing patterns beyond 10; counting numbers up to 99, counting in various patterns up to 99; adding more to a group, taking away from a group and identifying how many were added or subtracted; sharing; grouping; even and odd sharing; and, playing with and building doubles.

**Things to do at home...** Practise counting numbers up to 99 and writing numbers 0 - 9; practise adding and subtracting small amounts together; and practise sharing objects equally into groups using things from around the house e.g. spoons, pennies, pencils.

##### Shape, Pattern and Position:

Selecting shapes for purpose; rotating shapes; manipulating shapes; explaining and describing shape arrangements and patterns; making shapes; copying 2-D shape pictures; identifying 2-D shapes within 3-D shapes; identifying rules of repeating patterns; creating pattern rules; visualising from and describing different positions; and, exploring, representing and creating maps.

**Things to do at home...** Look at simple maps of the local area when visiting a park or shopping centre or encourage the creation of patterns with clothing, such as sock, during laundry time.

## Understanding the World

This term, the children will be learning about **Minibeasts** and **Travelling and Transport**.

During the first half of term, the children will learn about the different types of **minibeasts** ('slimy snails'; 'buzzing bees'; 'spinning spiders'; beautiful butterflies'; and 'crawling caterpillars'). The children will be introduced to the concept of minibeasts, and what they are, and they will make observations of minibeasts: what they look like; what they eat; and how they help the world around us. The children will also be learning about the **life cycles** of some minibeasts, e.g. the life cycle of a butterfly, and about the similarities and differences between bees. They will also be introduced to the concept of a **habitat**.

### Things to do at home...

How many different types of minibeasts can your child find around your garden and home? Talk about what your favourite minibeast is and why, e.g. *'I like ladybirds because they have colourful and spotty wings.'*

During the second half of the term, the children will learn about **Travelling and Transport**. The children will be learning about the importance of travel to our daily lives and they will learn about different types of journeys (e.g. how we travel by land, water and air), learning to name and describe different types of vehicles.

### Things to do at home...

Discuss a journey you and your child have been on together. *What type of transport did you take? Have you ever been on a holiday together? Where did you go and how did you get there?*

## Physical Development

This term, the children will be learning **gymnastics**, where they will be learning to develop confidence in fundamental movements and learning and refining a variety of shapes, jumps, balances and rolls. The children will also be linking simple balance, jump and travel actions. In **dance**, they will recognise actions can be performed to music, and copy, repeat and perform some basic actions to music.

## Personal, Social and Emotional Development

This term, the children will revisit our **Golden Rules**. They will also focus upon the **relationships** they have in their lives and learn about being safe with others. They will look at their relationships with themselves and with others, and learn about how they can make these relationships positive. They will learn to develop skills to negotiate with their peers and work out disagreements with others. The children will also learn about the importance of accepting others and about cultural differences.



## Expressive Arts and Design

This term, we will use our creative skills to focus upon **3-D modelling** and **collage**. The children will be learning to use a variety of materials to create a collage of a steam train. The children will also be learning about the famous artist **Matisse**, and studying his famous picture 'The Snail'. The children will create their own snail collages inspired by Matisse's work.

## Computing

Children will continue to use a variety of computer programs and the Internet to develop their computer and keyboard skills.

### Things to do at home...

## RE

### Christianity - What makes a place special?

This term, Reception will be learning that different places have special meaning to different people. The children will look at different denominations of Christian faith and the practices that are similar and different between them. The role of the church in Christian faith and the mosque in the faith of many Muslims will be investigated.

### World faiths - What can we learn from stories?

This term, Reception will be introduced to stories from Christianity, Judaism and Islam. The children will look at what the different stories are trying to tell people and how these stories can help people in their own lives. Looking at differences and similarities between the stories, the children will learn how to make comparisons between their own lives and the lives of others.

## How can I help at home?

Encourage your child to look at and share a variety of books. Ask them to talk about what is happening in the pictures and see if they can tell the story.

Encourage them to look around them and talk about what they see and hear. This could be on the way to school, in the park, or on a shopping trip.

Listen to your child read and ask them questions about the text to help their understanding, e.g. *Why did that happen? Who said that?* Encourage your child to sound out words they are unable to read by sight (for example, c – a – t makes cat).

Talk to your child about their family and cultural background. For example, food, clothing and language.

Encourage your child's interest in coins by asking them to 'pay' for items using pennies.

When washing up, count items out of the sink and ask your child to help you.

Make it clear that you value homework – set aside a specific time and area for your child to work on their homework. Your child will receive homework once a week. Help them to be organised with their time so that their homework is handed in on time.

Allow your child to get themselves dressed and undressed. Encourage them to look smart for school, for example, tucking their shirt in and making sure their collars are tidy.

### Help your child to be organised:

- ◇ Have you got your **book bag**? Needs to be in school **every day**.
- ◇ Are **ALL** your reading books inside it?
- ◇ Have you completed your **homework**?
